



- Agriculture and food production in Serbia have an extensive tradition
- Availability of arable land and perfect climate conditions blessed Serbia with diversity of fruit and vegetable varieties
- In the food production and in the food-processing subsectors exports account respectively for about 25 and 35% of total Serbia turnover depending on the year
- The past decade of Serbian food industry was highlighted by foreign investments
- Serbia could produce triple quantities of food than it does at this moment, due to unused soil and perfect climate conditions.



- An excellent raw material base, network of FTAs, a long tradition of high-quality food production and a strong regional brands are key reasons world class companies have chosen Serbia as their agri-food investment destination. The agri-food sector accounts for a massive proportion of foreign direct investments, whether in terms of value or of the number of projects.
- Made-in-Serbia food is present around the globe, from Japan to the US, and is sold under Serbian brands and through world's largest supermarket chains such as Tesco, Lidl, Asda, Spar, Carrefour, Metro, Idea, Leader price, Kopeika, and Rewe. International customers keep increasing orders for Serbian truffles, raspberries, apples, corn, juices, concentrates, purees, jams, frozen and dried fruit and other first-class produce.























Fruit production

- Fruit production is one of the key subsectors of Serbia's economic development and therefore given a strategic treatment by the Government of Serbia. In 2019 export of Serbian fruits amounted 568.2 millions of euros.
- Serbia's exports represents 31.7% of the world exports of frozen raspberries, blackberries, mulberries, loganberries in 2019.
- With 148,000 tons exported and with total value of more than \$250 million in 2019, Serbia is ranked as no. 1 world exporter of frozen berries.

Vegetable production

- Ideal climate for vegetable production makes Serbia the main vegetable exporter and supplier of the South Eastern Europe. The most popular vegetables produced in Serbia are: paprika (pepper), cabbage, tomato and potato.
- Pepper production is oriented towards pasteurized pepper in different forms: shredded, cooked and roasted. Due to dry matter in it, majority of red pepper is used for production of aromatic spices, but also for preparing a traditional Serbian winter dish - "Ajvar" spread.

Meat production

- The most popular meat products are fresh or smoked pork and beef, as well as poultry. At the same time, products such as pate, dry sausage of different types, hot dogs and smoked beef and pork are widely spread through all chains of supermarkets in the region.
- Free Trade Agreement define new quotas for duty free export from Serbia to Turkey, pertaining to beef, sunflower oil, sunflower seeds, soybeans, animal feed and pet food, and the quotas for export of peas, beans, green peas, sweet corn and prunes have been increased. Serbia would be able to export, free of duty, 5.000 tons of fresh, chilled or frozen beef thanks to Free trade Agreement.

The production of beef is the branch in which Serbia has potential to become more competitive. This potential was spotted by German, French and DUTCH investors who already opened feed processing plants.

Diary production

- Besides "kajmak", a creamy dairy spread originally made in Serbia, Serbia has various dairy products to offer internationally. Sour yoghurt, paprika in sour cream and white soft and hard cheeses are among the most popular ones. All of these products originate straight from century long tradition of Serbian cuisine.
- Fresh and pasteurized milk of the highest quality is mainly used for meeting high local consumption, but also easily finds export markets in the neighboring Montenegro and Bosnia and Herzegovina.
- White salad cheese, sour cream spread, hard cheese and goat cheese have already found their customers on the Russian market.

A distinctive dairy product of Serbian cuisine, cheese pule, is the "world's most expensive cheese", fetching €1,000 per Kg





There are 517 high schools in Serbia, with approximately 60,978 graduates each year:




University Education







Labour cost (€) GROSS AVERAGE MONTHLY SALARIES





Corporate Profit Tax (%)





Externally, Serbia can serve as a manufacturing hub for duty-free "made in Serbia" exports to a market of more than 1 billion people that includes the EU, USA, Turkey, South East Europe, the European Free Trade Agreement members, as well as Russian Federation and Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU) member states.



 - Law on Investments





Financial Incentives

To offset initial capital investments and ease the start-up of business endeavours, the Government of Serbia offers financial support for projects in the manufacturing sectors and services sector which may be subject to international trade.

Payroll Tax Incentives

Employment of people who were registered with the National Unemployment Agency for more than 6 months entitles employers to a sizable relief of taxes paid on net salary from the moment of employment:

1-9 new jobs: 65% reduction

10-99 new jobs: 70% reduction

■ 100+ new jobs: 75% reduction

(payroll tax incentives can't be combined with Financial Incentives)

Corporate Income Tax Incentives

A 10 year Corporate Income Tax Holiday is available for investors who hire more than 100 employees and invest more than 8.3 million euros (1 billion RSD). Tax holiday begins once the company starts making a profit.

Agricultural Subsidies

REGULATION ON SUBSIDIES IN PRIMARY AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT


The incentives according to their type listed in the Article 5, paragraph 2 of this Regulation (Published in the "Official Gazette of RS", No. 8/16 of February 1, 2016) are directly paid in their maximum amounts as follows:

- 7 dinars per litre of milk;
- 2,000 dinars per hectare of corps;
- 25,000 dinars per head of high-quality breeding dairy cow;
- 25,000 dinars per head of beef breeding cattle;
- 7,000 dinars per breeding sheep and goats;
- 7,000 dinars per high-quality breeding sows;
- 60 dinars per head of parent stock- heavy breeds of chickens;
- 100 dinars per head of parent stock- light breeds of chickens;
- 300 dinars per head of parent stock turkeys;
- 500 dinars per head of high-quality breeding carp -parent fish;

- 300 dinars per head of high-quality breeding trout -parent fish;
- 10,000 dinars per head of fattening of beef cattle;
- 2,000 dinars per head of fattening of lambs;
- 2,000 dinars per head of fattening of goats;
- 1,000 dinars per head of fattening of pigs;
- 20,000 dinars per head of dairy cows;
- 600 dinars per bee hive;
- 10 dinars per kilo of produced fish;
- Refund for fertilizer will be paid 2,000 dinars per hectare of arable land;
- Refund for the costs of storage in public warehouses will be paid 40 % of the cost of storage.

INCENTIVES AND ELIGIBLE INVESTMENTS IN PRIMARY LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION AND PRIMARY PLANTS PRODUCTION

In accordance with the Rules on Investments in Agriculture, incentives for the support of primary livestock production are granted (as stated in the Official Gazzete of RS number 38/2016). The incentives aim at improving competitiveness and achieving quality standards in agriculture. These incentives make 40 % of the valid cost of investment, or 55 % of it if a holding is in the area with difficult working conditions in agriculture. The maximum amount of these incentives can't be higher than 6,000,000 dinars. This subsidies are intended for purchase of new equipment and machinery in the production of livestock and plant production. Subsidies are also intended for construction of cold storage; construction of grain storage facilities; and construction of facilities for the storage of meat.





The existing infrastructure, speed of issuance of building permits, administrative procedures and existing transport corridors and logistics, provide solid and stable business environment, similar to the business environment in the EU.

With the formation of the national airline - Air Serbia in 2013, Belgrade International Airport has increased a number of passengers for over 60%.


Duration of Flights

• Meggle was founded in 1887 in Germany and today ranks among the most renowned manufacturers of dairy products, not only in Europe but also in Asia and America.




- In 2011 Meggle AG made an acquisition of Kragujevac's dairy "Mladost", founded in 1954, beginning its production in Serbia.


